KUROSOLS: Acidic soils with an abrupt increase in clay

- Strongly acid soils with an abrupt increase in clay.
- Extend from southern Queensland, through coastal and subcoastal New South Wales, to Tasmania. Less common in south-west Western Australia.
- Vegetation is largely dependent on rainfall and ranges from eucalypt woodlands to open forests.
- Some areas have been cleared and used for dairying on improved pastures. In the higher rainfall areas of New South Wales and Tasmania, Kurosols are used for forestry. Small areas in Western Australia are used for cereal growing and lower rainfall woodlands support sparse cattle grazing.
