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Kenneth Creek

Immediately west of the Nive River and approximately 10 km north west of Bronte Park is an area consisting of undulating plains with rocky outcrops and terraced slopes. It is underlain predominantly by basalt although sediments of the Parmeener supergroup occur on slope components.

Organic soils are typically found in swamps where sedgelands of Restio australis and Empodisma minus dominate over Astelia alpina herbfield. stony, gravelly yellowish brown gradational soils characterise slope and rocky crests where they support low woodland or low open forests of Eucalyptus coccifera and E. delegatensis. On soils derived from sedimentary rocks open heaths with Richea acerosa, Hakea epiglottis, Lissanthe montana and Epacris gunnii are widespread.

Grazing and recreation are the present land uses, while waterlogging and sheet erosion are potential hazards.
